Valley View Hospital Expands and Renovates its Critical Care Unit

Valley View's 10-bed critical care unit (CCU) offers the area's most sophisticated intensive care for cardiology, surgical, trauma, pediatric and other patients. Valley View is the only hospital from Grand Junction to Denver that offers this level of intensive care. As our Valley grows, the number of patients requiring care in the CCU has increased to a point where additional rooms are needed. Concurrently, the complexity of patient health care needs also continues to increase, requiring renovation of existing rooms in the CCU to match that complexity.

Referring providers continue to choose our CCU to send their patients to when a higher level of care is required. Additonally, pediatric patients requiring hospitalization are cared for in Valley View's CCU, ensuring the highest level of care for these young patients. In turn, the unit's patient volumes have remained high.

The CCU was constructed in 2006 as part of a larger multiphase masterplan that effectively expanded and rebuilt the hospital in-place. This project includes the renovation of six of the original 10 CCU rooms and construction of an additional three rooms. While four of the 10 original rooms have been previously renovated to create "step-down" care for patients, six rooms remained outdated. Each renovated room will benefit from a new headwall system, the feature that combines electrical and medical gas functions while managing cords and tubing, at the head of the patient bed. New floors, cabinetry and other aesthetic upgrades will support both patient safety and experience plus nursing workflow.



Three new rooms will be constructed, repurposing space from the Acute Care wing adjacent to the CCU. These rooms will care for the highest acuity patients. A new nurses' station and storage will accompany these new rooms, as will a small physical therapy area. Lastly, a new family room will offer a dedicated space for family members or close friends of patients, enabling these care partners to remain close.

The cost of this project, including design, construction and equipment, totals \$4.1 million. Valley View asks our community to join this effort to support and expand the advanced level of care available to our region.

It may seem like a small thing, and it is, in fact, a small thing, a toy teddy bear, but when a child or a parent has to leave Valley View and be moved to another hospital, having the sound of a loved one's voice close by, is really a big thing.

This was the thinking behind the Bear With Me program at Valley View. It started seven years ago when Watts Brooks, the son of Dr. Ellen Brooks and Dr. David Brooks, envisioned the program. "When Watts was 13 he was bar mitzvah-ed, and with any bar mitzvah, he needed a community service project," says Dr. Ellen Brooks. "He was interested in aviation and so he wanted to do something related to that. He spent a lot of time at the hospital and would watch the helicopter take off."

Knowing how many children were often flown to Denver and other locations without their parents for comfort, Watts created this program of providing teddy bears with the ability to record a family member's voice that was then given to the child during what was a frightening time.

"The idea is to have a comforting voice with an infant, a child or even with an adult who needs the support," says Dr. Brooks.

Case managers have access to the bears and can offer them to any patient encountering a medical flight and are deemed in need of a soothing message.

Hundreds of Bear With Me bears have been tucked into the arm, blanket or crib of patients since 2014, and while it's a small token of love, it means a lot to the patient and their families. The purchase of these bears is funded through private donations via the Valley View Foundation.

"Parents often feel helpless when they are being separated from a child," says Dr. Brooks. "In some ways this program is as much for the parent as it is for the child. It gives parents something they can do, and in part distracts them from the weight of what's going on."
